


Origami Santa's made during Origami club run by Helian T in year 10. The club meets every Wednesday lunch in B3 if anyone else would like to learn the art!

A Headteacher's award was awarded to Maisie last year but unable to be presented due to Covid restrictions. Maisie was asked to produce an artistic response to one of the poems from the Year 8 Anthology. Maisie chose **'Not Waving but Drowning' by Stevie Smith**. Her art was intended to show the public and private face of the speaker in the poem and how they disguised their problems until their problems overwhelmed them.



"I chose the poem "Not waving but drowning" because at first the poem seems quite simple and not very descriptive, but when you take the time to look closely at the language used it says that it is about a man who is suffering but puts on a brave face, so no one knows. Unifrog also offer lots of fascinating free webinars. Students and parents/guardians can access these live and from the archives from topics such as:



It has long been an SHSG tradition for Year 7 to spend a day bonding in their form groups writing a seasonal song to perform in the annual Christmas Concerts. As music A-level students, we are given the opportunity to organise and support a form each on their song-writing journey and are responsible for coordinating rehearsals and conducting their performance in one of the Christmas Concerts.

The day begins with small groups within the form writing their own Christmas song, surrounding a theme of their choice; for example, some forms may choose Santa and others may choose snow. Following breaktime and much-needed refreshment, every group performs their composed song to the rest of their form before voting on which song they love the most, therefore selecting the song they will perform as a form group. Once the favoured song is selected, it is taught to everyone else along with actions and, for the ambitious, harmonies.



Whilst in 2020 we had to conduct this day in a slightly different fashion due to restrictions, this year we were able to return to 'normal' – or at least close to it, introducing the whole year group to the music department early into their SHSG lives and exposing them to just a small portion of what we have to offer as a Department. The year group are brilliant to work with and this year most forms seemed very eager to include a witty rap in their songs, which added to the tangible sense of excitement and allowed us to bond with the students in each of our forms. I know, as a Year 13 student who joined as an 'external' sixth former, that it was an opportunity that hadn't been presented to me before and I will remember for years to come after I have left SHSG.

Southend Music Festival success

On the 16th November, the SHSG Orchestra and Wind Band took part in the **Southend Musical Festival** for the first time in two years due to the pandemic. It was a very special feeling to be able to perform again in front of an audience and share our music with the community. Both ensembles were successful in winning the first-place trophy with high marks in their respective classes.

The adjudicator said the Orchestra's rendition of the Mission Impossible Theme was **'exciting'** with **'well contrasted and controlled dynamics'** and complimented the **'lovely unison'** woodwind sound and **'good balance'** of the brass in Carmen.

The woodwind section was commended for their **'great opening chords'**, **'intonation'** and **'tight rhythms'** in the Hairspray medley played by Wind Band; they also showed good **'articulation'** in Under the Sea.



Novem Consort performed on Friday the 19th winning one of their two evening classes. It was a very enjoyable evening singing alongside two well-established adult choirs, Southend Vox and Alumni, celebrating choral music. We were praised for our **'good dynamic range'** in Northern Lights and **'clear rhythms'** in Carol of the Bells with both pieces being performed **'musically and effectively'**. Laudate Dominum had an **'effective opening'** and there was a **'good balance'** in The Long Day Closes.

We thank the festival for giving us this opportunity and platform to share our love of music with the wider community and look forward to returning with even more ensembles in 2022.

This is a brilliant achievement to qualify for such a prestigious competition, especially as the youngest in their events!



UN COP 26 mini conference at SHSG

Designed to simulate real life events, SHSG hosted three lunch time conferences where each form represented a country.

Each country was allowed to speak for a maximum of 3 minutes only around the key themes of:

cash, cars, coal and trees

These themes were highlighted by Boris Johnson as the UK hosted the real event in Glasgow.

In preparation for the debate's forms used morning registration times and the resources provided to research and develop their countries prioritise and views on the four themes already mentioned.

The Year 9 and 10 kicked off the debate on Thursday 11/11 swiftly followed by Year 12 and 13. Year 7 and 8 has their event on Tuesday 16th November.

All debates were equally frustrating as we could not agree on a consensus easily without extending deadlines to reach targets beyond 2060 – which is deemed too late to stop warming going beyond 2 degrees.

This was mirrored by real life events in Glasgow where decisions were hampered by countries not wanting to agree to ' phasing out coal ' but only ' phasing down coal ' use for example.

We aim to reply to you within one working day and you should get an immediate follow-back to confirm we received your text. Texts will not be seen outside of normal working hours. If you need help before you hear back from us, contact a member of school staff or your doctor. Our text number does not receive voice calls or MMS pictures. We support messaging from UK mobile numbers only which does not include messages sent from landlines, international mobile numbers and some 'burner' mobile apps. Prevent the school nurse from sending messages to you by texting STOP to our number. Please respect your schools mobile phone policy. Messages are charged at your usual rate.
