




Sixth Form Cambridge Chemistry Challenge

The Cambridge Chemistry challenge aims to stretch and challenge students interested in chemistry and provides an excellent experience for anyone considering taking their studies further. Set by an experienced team of teachers and university chemists, it is designed to be accessible to Year 12 students but will take them significantly beyond the syllabus and encourage them to think about science in the way they would at university.

In June Year 12 chemistry students were given the opportunity to take part in the Cambridge Chemistry challenge. This year, in excess of 8,400 students took part nationally in the challenge - these will be high achieving students from the 55,000 students that take A-level chemistry each year.

Year 11 students obtained the Copper award - Ellie S, Sangavi S, Milly F, Haider I, Ella P, Mewiny D, Ester-Grace O, Dhakshana A, Isabel S, Olivia R, Elena R-J. Some just one mark from the silver award. Two students obtained the Silver award - Molly W and Sophie P (one of these was one mark away from gold). Silver award was awarded to 22% of the already selective cohort.

This was an amazing achievement of a challenging paper that goes beyond the A-level Chemistry specification. Well done to all students that attempted the challenge giving up lunch time to complete the task.



Biology Challenge

Students in Year 9 and Year 10undertook the Biology Challenge which is a national competition for all students aged 13-15. We had some great results with 3 students awarded Silver and another 3 students awarded Bronze. Students found the Biology Challenge enjoyable and have engaged in learning that goes beyond the curriculum.



Microbiology Poster Competition

Our KS3 and KS4 Biologists were awarded certificates for their entries in the Microbiology Poster Competition organised by MiSAC (Microbiology in Schools Advisory Committee).

Students found these activities enjoyable and have been stimulated in learning more about Microbiology through this competition.





Bringing Sociology to Life

On Thursday 9th June, Year 12 Sociology A level students joined sixth form students from The King Edmund school to take part in a live Teams discussion with eminent sociologist Professor Louise Archer from the Institute of Education at UCL. This was a great opportunity to bring our curriculum to life, and students benefited from being able to ask Professor Archer questions linked to their studies.

Students enjoyed hearing about her route to becoming an educational researcher. Professor Archer talked about some of the research she has worked on, such as the 'Nike Identities' study, investigating why students from some social groups may be less likely to go to university, and what can be done to improve their life chances.

Sociology Captain Deborah remarked: "In sociology we study the work of many different theorists, so it was very beneficial to have an opportunity to talk with somebody that has an impact on aspects of our course. It was great to ask Professor Archer about her research and understand her thought processes and reasonings. Talking to her first hand makes all the difference. It was an amazing session"

The sociology department has more sessions planned with leading sociologists such as Professor Diane Reay from Cambridge University, and Professor Venkatesh, author of 'Gang Leader for the Day, who will be speaking to us from Columbia University, USA.

On Friday 24th June, the Social Science faculty, as part of their work experience programme, took five Year 12 students to the local magistrate court. We observed cases on crimes such as multiple theft, traffic offences, and a case involving a globally connected criminal network who are alleged to have been growing cannabis locally. This was an excellent way for students to see first-hand the various career roles available in the criminal justice system, including probation officers, solicitors, clerks, ushers etc.

Later in the day, we also volunteered at St Vincent's Community Hub. St Vincent's is so much more than a foodbank- they offer wrap around care for vulnerable people in the community, such as providing a place to go and chat, hot food, clothes and household items for those who need them. The psychology students were interested to hear how they apply a 'trauma-based' approach. Centre Manager Dan told us that the centre really focusses on treating individuals with empathy. Students spent the afternoon sorting donated clothes. They were able to talk to some of the other volunteers and learned they have started an allotment locally to grow fresh produce for centre users. The visit enabled students to experience first-hand concepts that we discuss in Sociology, Psychology and Government and Politics. Students were able to apply relevant theories to explore reasons for inequalities in society. Later in the year, students hope to organise a collection for the food bank.

Miseducation- Sociology A level lecture by Professor Diane Reay

On Monday 11th July, Professor Diane Reay from Cambridge University delivered an online lecture to Sociology A level students on inequalities in the education system. Professor Reay is one of the key theorists on the syllabus for the Education Unit, and students benefited greatly from hearing about her research in person. She spoke of her route into academia after growing up in an economically disadvantaged area. Professor Reay compared the UK's performance in education to other countries. and proposed solutions on how this could be improved. She talked about the lack of social mobility in this country, and the growing wealth divide. She informed students of some moving statistics such as by age three, children living in poverty in the UK are already nine months behind their peers in development, and that 72% of children in poverty have parents who are working. Professor Reay also offered advice for those applying to Oxbridge.

Johnny Mars

On Friday 8th July we were privileged to welcome internationally acclaimed harmonica-player Johnny Mars to record his educational anthem, 'Dare to Dream.' The whole of Year 7 joined SHSG Choir and Chamber Choir to record the song in the hall, and the Media Captains conducted an interview later in the day – both the track and the interview will be available to listen and watch in due course. We were then able to call upon some of our alumni who are now working in the advertising industry to present a 15 minute talk to KS4 and 5 and run an hour long workshop for Sixth Form.



We would like to widen our database of presenters to give students an insight into possible career paths and invite parents and carers who would be willing to give a short 15 minute talk about their career to email careers@shsg.org. This could be in person or via Teams and would enable us to react flexibly to the interests of our students. Our KS4 and 5 students have had such talks on diverse areas such as apprenticeships in the National Health Service, careers in the arts, advertising and law where a practising barrister has led workshops to enable students to think like a lawyer. Students in Year 11-13 have all had one to one meetings with external careers advisory body 'Connexions' to give them impartial advice on their decision making post 16 and 18 and our connexions advisor will be present on results day to support pupils.

Subject teachers have received training in how to share careers opportunities related to their curriculum area with specific year groups on Unifrog. When students have engaged in these activities they can log their interaction on Unifrog with the idea being that over the years they can track their careers journey.

Currently year 12 students are using Unifrog to write their personal statements for the UCAS applications. The platform has been incredibly useful in brining all the information together in once place for students, teachers and form tutors.

Year 12 Work Experience

Year 12 students had the opportunity to participate in a one week work experience placement in June. Students secured a variety of placements from shadowing parliamentary advisors to landing a plan at Heathrow airport. Students have found the experience to be incredibly useful in helping to fine tune their careers goals.

Memories of SHSG by Gay Rosen

I have greatly enjoyed receiving the Southend High School Gazettes, and it prompted me to write about my experience at the school. Okay, it was quite a while ago (1960-65), but some memories last a lifetime...

I am still amazed that from the age of 11 since I grew up on Canvey Island, I had to take a bus, train and either another bus from the train station to the high School. The trains were diesel fuelled, and I can recall looking out of the train window (and getting quite dirty in the process!). There was never any thought of personal travel safety but then there was no internet way back when.

There were codes of conduct that were impressed upon us (emphatically), that became the norm and stayed with us. We were told to always stand for the elderly on a bus and allow them your seat, to always wear your beret (prompt on French pronunciation) when traveling to school. In looking at the school uniform required list, I see there is now no school scarf, no beret, and the blazer is now a beautiful shade of dark teal green. Back in the 1960's it was more of a Forest Green which was still nice but not as attractive. Back in the day, we wore a dark green serge skirt and in the summer a green and white gingham shirt dress. I still love the school crest and what it represents.

Some teachers will always make an impact on your life. One of my English teachers was wonderful and made such an impression upon me. She stressed upon us to only write about that which we knew. So simple, but so true! Something else my English teacher drummed into us was there is no such word as "CAN'T". She told us that we can do anything we set our minds to do. I loved learning about ancient Rome in history and I also truly liked Religious class. Why? Our teacher took the class on a class trip to a synagogue, different churches (no mosque in the neighbourhood back then), and explained that since we didn't get to choose our religion as we are born into them, we should all know what the other religions represented. It was a wonderful and insightful way to touch upon different religions and traditions, and to teach us all to be tolerant to all.

Back in the 1960's, we were taught sewing with sewing machines, there were great art classes, cooking (don't remember too much there) and I can recall having a small part in Thornton Wilder's "Our Town!" at the school. I was complimented by a returning actress who had attended our school and who critiqued the play with my portrayal of a man being spot on. Yikes! Southend High School gave us so many opportunities to learn, and to fulfill our dreams if we applied ourselves. I loved sports although our gym teacher scared me.

She always pushed us to do more. As a result, in my late twenties I found myself running mini marathons!

Where did the school take me? I now live in the United States and am a Realtor by profession. I married an Endodontist (a Dentist specializing in Root canal). I did apply myself finally with earning many real estate designations, and I have been awarded guite a few awards so I have been successful. I would like to think more importantly that I have been successful in being kind to others, and in donating many hours to various charities. I taught cooking for 2 years at the local Boys and Girls Club, made cakes for the homebound for two years, and my children and I delivered meals on wheels to the homebound and elderly for 7 years. I was children's advocate for learning disabled children for 2 years, on the Board of Trustees for the Scarsdale Adult School, and created a newsletter for luge athletes entitled "On The Fast Track" and volunteering at the Local Humane Society. I was even a coach in baseball and soccer! (The men cringed). I have had a blog site since 2008 which allows me to write about local events as well as promoting my real estate listings I would like to think that the principles of Southend High School for Girls help set the example to live by. Only write about what you know. However, as an aside I truly regret not applying myself to learning French and Spanish, and studying more. Yes, my parents never encouraged me but I should have applied myself more. I can recall that prior to taking my O levels. I tasked myself to reading all of the James Bond books by Ian Fleming. Just saying to anyone who is doing the same. Don't!

I wrote a children's book last year entitled "It's Okay to Walk in the Rain" a children's book featuring my pooch, Binky who was found starved and close to death on the street to hopefully help young children with small anxieties. I am in the process of writing a follow up book entitled "Binky's Bucket List . Ha! It is fun to write!

In today's world, there is nothing you cannot accomplish if you set your mind to it. Wait a second, where did I hear that and from whom?

I also had 3 sons, one played baseball for Great Britain (Brett, now 30), and another, A.J. was a three time Olympian in the sport of luge for Great Britain. He then became a Commercial Pilot, and unfortunately passed away last year with cancer at the young age of 37. My oldest son, Mark, works for Cartier as a Project Manager.

In closing, I am blessed and feel privileged to have attended the High School. Enjoy your time there.

Isobel has been selected to represent Essex at the largest Scout Jamboree to be held in South Korea during 2023

Isobel is one of 3,240 young people that have been selected from the UK to join 50,000 young people taking part in the World Scout Jamboree. The Jamboree is a skills, cultural and adventure festival happening in sensational and scenic South Korea. In the summer of 2023 Isobel will be meeting thousands of Scouts from nearly every country in the world – sharing her skills. This will be the first time that so many young people from so many different nations will be gathering together since the Covid-19 pandemic began.

The World Scout Jamboree offers young people the chance to learn new skills that they can use in other aspects of their life as well as campaign for change on key world issues that matter to them. Isobel had to work hard to be selected, writing an application, and going on a camp to be judged and interviewed on what she would contribute to a unit.

The World Scout Jamboree will be the culmination of 18 months' work for the young people and their volunteer leaders, who together are called the UK Contingent.

Between now and July 2023 Isobel will attend training camps and team building events preparing them for living on the hot and humid site in SaeManGeum, Korea.

Isobel is fundraising as are all the other Scouts chosen, to make this event happen. She will have to raise £3800. All proceeds raised will go towards this event.

She will be holding many fundraising events, including raffles, and would be very thankful if you could help in any way.

The Korean hosts of the Jamboree have challenged participants to "Drawn your Dream" and as part of their Jamboree journey Isobel will have the opportunity to discover new cultures and take part in activities focusing on the environment, skills development and global development issues.

UK Chief Scout Bear Grylls, said:

'Congratulations to Isobel and all those who have been selected to go on this amazing adventure! World Scout Jamborees only happen every four years and tens of thousands of Scouts from across the world attend each one. Young people will experience different cultures, languages and cuisine while learning new skills. After two very difficult years, it is so important that these young people have this opportunity. 'The 2023 Jamboree, hosted by Korea, is set to be one of the biggest and most exciting yet. The theme is "Think big. Dream wild. Act together." – focusing especially on how we can be trailblazers in creating a sustainable world together.'



On 1st July, Novem Consort travelled to Berlin to perform as part of **Choralspace Berlin's 'Summer Festival.'** It was a packed weekend where they walked over 40km in three days exploring the city, seeing the many historical sights, and of course partaking in musical activities.

The weekend began with a tremendous performance of Mozart's Requiem at the Philharmonie concert hall, the home of the Berlin Philharmonic. On Saturday, Novem Consort performed in a church service and performed a short concert afterwards, which was then followed by a two-hour workshop with California's 'Teacher of the Year 2014', Michael Hayden. Michael was such a warm and inspiring director, and the techniques and advice he offered the choir totally transformed their sound and boosted their confidence as an ensemble. On Sunday they travelled to a small district on the outskirts of the city, Köpernick, where they performed in an outdoor festival and were applauded with cheers from the audience – with particular enthusiasm after Mendelssohn's 'Hebe dein augen auf' from Elijah. The trip was long awaited, following the cancellation of our planned attendance at the World Choir Games in Belgium in 2020, and it was marvellous to see the choir grow not only musically, but in having the opportunity to engage with so
