# Year 12 trip to The Houses of Parliament

Year 12 had a fantastic day at The Houses of Parliament this week. It was PMQs an hour after the tour, so students saw the chambers buzzing with people and press, which was very exciting for them. SHSG students took part in a lively debate and gained an excellent insight into how laws are made. They also visited the Supreme Court as well as visiting the museum. A few students were fortunate to hear cases in the public gallery. The tour guides commented on how knowledgeable they all were. We were very proud of them and glad that they came away feeling inspired and enriched by the history and workings of the most powerful institutions in the United Kingdom.





# Queen's College, Oxford: MFL Competition - Anthea Bell Prize for Young Translators

During the spring term, students in Years 7-10 MFL lessons were given the opportunity to experience the process of creative translation through specially selected poems, fiction and non-fiction texts from the Translation Exchange, Queen's College, Oxford, in preparation for the competition launch. The competition is inspired by the life and work of the great translator Anthea Bell, who is famous for translating the French Asterix comics into English. Students learnt that literal translation is the process of taking words from one language and changing them to words in another language. This method cannot be used with all types of text, particularly with poems, jokes, slang and idioms as it is impossible to translate these directly without losing the meaning. Creative translation, however, factors this in and adjusts the texts so that the newly translated document keeps all the emotions, tone and feeling of the original.

Well done to all the students who participated in the competition. Over 15,000 students took part across the UK and schools submitted the top 5 entries in each level. A team of 36 judges assessed the 3,500 entries and winners were recently announced. Huge congratulations to Emma M in Year 10 whose translation won a commendation!












#### Summer concert

On Monday evening, the Music Department presented their long-awaited Summer Concert: a culmination of two terms of rehearsals, featuring the whole range of ensembles in a joyful celebration of music-making. Music Captain, Angela hosted the event which opened with the Wind Band performing a medley of Dr Who and an arrangement of songs from the show Wicked. After the subtitled 'Tempo di Timelord', more traditional music entered the fray: highlights included the Chamber Choir's performance of *Set Me As A Seal*, wildly contrasted with the Andrews Sisters' Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy; later, a Baroque-inspired set by the newly formed *Ensemble Antique* included a beautiful aria sung by Chan H. which naturally led to a Jazz Waltz, including flute solo performed by Imogen C. and harpsichord played by Isobel W. There were smaller instrumental ensembles between, including the Flute Ensemble directed by Joely L. and String Ensemble playing Handel. To finish, SHSG Orchestra performed the exuberant Polovstian Dances from Borodin's Prince Igor. The stand-out finale was the final movement, a well-known Rondo, from Mozart's Horn Concerto No.4, with French Horn solo performed brilliantly by Gabriella C. Following this, Mr Carey presented Gabriella with the Concerto Shield, engraved with all the previous winners of this trophy dating back to 2014. Well done to all students who took part in this concert.

#### **Year 10 Taster Day**

On Monday our Year 10 students threw themselves into A Level study, with a suite of Taster Lessons in A Level Courses. They chose five subjects and will have a second opportunity for a taster session in Year 11 to help inform their A level choices. Students looked at topics from oligopolies in economics, to the legacy of Henry VIII in history, and are pictured below completing some A level chemistry and physics practicals. Ella L said 'the day was really helpful to give me an insight into what I want to study, and to feel what A level lessons will be like at SHSG. I really enjoyed English Language; I could see how it links to my future career goals'. Poppy N said 'classics was so interesting, it gave me a clear insight into the A Level and I loved discussing Greek mythology and its comparisons to Christianity.
