




## English ~ Literary Review 2023

## Write up for BFI Trip

As a year 12 media student, I was excited to attend the Media Magazine conference with my school. Although I have visited the BFI previously, nothing is quite as awe striking as sitting in the auditorium, luckily in the second row for me, listening to living history of media explaining their experiences and opinions. I expected to gain a large amount of knowledge by attending but I was not expecting just how valuable this trip would be for both my studies and my own personal interest in the media, and especially not that I'd be able to ask questions and speak to the guests.

The perfect way to start the day was with Dr Nwonka who shared a presentation on 'Film, Media and Black Screen Identities'. Due to this being a typically under and misrepresented part of society, as Dr Nwonka made frequent references to in the lecture, I was very intrigued as to what I could learn from listening. He often drew upon our set theorist Stuart Hall to explain his views on this topic. For example, Hall's 'Relations of Representation' idea where identity must negotiate with cultural texts pairs with Dr Nwonka's experiences watching black individuals on television growing up and viewing it as a "novel experience". He also argued that a moral panic created by newspapers lead to a "narrative fiction" of black identity and crime often associated with this group in a "sensationalised" manner. This meant that events such as the Notting Hill Carnival were often met with "heavy policing of collective black identity", and the stereotype of the hooded, black youth became a "central antagonist" of riots. From this, the Urban film began as a trope with 'Storm damage' to legitimise moral panic. Although these negative representations of the black community are very important to spread awareness about, Dr Nwonka made a point to focus on the "masculine way" of approaching race that most modern texts take; he noticed that "questions of gender have often been denied" when considering race. An example of this can be seen through 'Top Boy' whereas 'Rye Lane' subverts this convention to instead focus on a softer romance.

The next event was my personal favourite of the day: a conversation with Armando lannucci. The relaxed manner of this talk contained the perfect blend of knowledge and humour that also reflects the tone of his media texts. Iannucci is arguably most famous for his political satires 'The Day Today' and 'The Thick of It' both written for the BBC. In 'The Day Today', he wanted humour to arise from media techniques such as editing and music, rather than spoken jokes to make the show seem more realistic. This realistic tone carried on into 'The Thick of It' with actors being given relative freedom over their delivery of the script. Another technique I found very interesting in the production of this show was that the cameras were told to just "follow the actors around" in order to capture multiple angles to find the funniest take that would make it into the Final Cut of the episode. Iannucci revealed his golden rule of comedic acting to "always respond to what you hear" because an honest reaction could be funnier than anything prewritten in the script. Before I move onto his other works, I would like to share a quote that resonated with me from lannucci. When speaking of the differences between political satire of 'The Thick of It' and the modern day, he said "a lot of politicians are their own comedians... and the comedians become journalists". Iannucci also described the importance of the editing process in media production as it is "really where you make the story". I have previously mentioned his writing for the BBC, and his respect for the institution was clear from his talk. He mentioned that he often has to "defend the BBC against government attacks" because a "response to a story is unpredictable" and this scared those in power. Now to the absolute highlight of my day, getting to personally ask lannucci a question. I wanted to understand the process of creating humour from real life events, such as in 'The Death of Stalin', which he described as a tightrope walk between tragedy and comedy, electing to focus on the failure of those in charge rather than the suffering of the public.

After a short break, in which I secured an autograph and photo with Armando lannucci, I settled back into my seat for a joint lecture on the 'Evolution of the Gaming Industry'. First up was Shahid Kamal Ahmad who explained the depth and speed of development in the gaming industry since he joined in 1982 when it was only seen as a "hobby". After blowing our minds with some crazy comparisons between the gaming industry and space exploration, Ahmad went into some of his own experiences working for Play Station. Next up was Sophie Artemigi who explained the highs and lows of being a solo game developer. She made the game 'Hook Up' which received mix reviews upon its publication to the App Store. Artemigi explained her top tips to 1. Delegate aspects in the development you're not confident in 2. Of these aspects push yourself on one of them for each subsequent project 3. Take notes from the reactions of the audience to different iterations of the game 4. Make use of social media for advertising.

A change of sector led us to Charlie Phillips' talk on 'Documentary Film'. The style of his presentation, playing the trailers of different documentaries then explaining the production behind them, was very enjoyable and helped me learn a lot. He explained the duties he held as a documentary producer, including managing the budget, helping the director, planning the release, and much more. Something that surprised me was the number of different types of documentaries there are and the distinct differences you can see between them. There are documentaries aiming to promote impact/justice/change, recount history/politics, for entertainment, acting as a form of art, or acting as visual essays. And each documentary will be either story, character or idea focused. Although unfortunately there was not time to ask Phillips questions, I gained a lot of knowledge about the production of documentaries from his lecture.

After lunch, I managed to retain my seat in the second row ready for Rowan Ellis' lecture on 'LGBTQ+ Representation in Advertising'. Like I said with Dr Nwonka, because this is a typically under and misrepresented section of society, and also an area of personal interest to me, I was very excited to listen. Ellis opened with a quote I feel every media student should know, "media is manipulation". And advertising is the manipulation of the audience to pay for the service being offered. Very early on, they made it clear how important LGBTQ+ representation is as it helps to combat prejudice and reflects the real world.

After this, they went on to explain the effect of various adverts featuring LGBTQ+ themes on both the community and society as a whole. The 1990s IKEA advert promoted huge discourse with some going so far as to boycott the company purely because one advert in a wide campaign featured a gay couple. Twenty years later in the 2013 Kindle advert, the word 'husband' was used for the first time in an advert when referring to a gay couple. Although this may seem like a step forward, the advert falls flat when you realise this was only said to create a joke that a modern audience would not understand with our more accepting (but by all means not perfect) climate. Ellis went on to explain 'rainbow capitalism' and how many companies will half-heartedly advertise supporting the LGBTQ+ community simply because it is a "trend in the industry". However, there are some companies that appear to actually care about campaigning. Levis' pride campaign was not focused on their product, and they did a lot behind the scenes to ensure equal treatment and benefits for all their workers. Another good example would be Absolut Vodka who as well as having a long history of working with the LGBTQ+ community in their adverts, also have an 'Absolut Ally' tab on their website which offers advice on how to be an ally to the community.

Perhaps the stars of the show, for my media teacher at least who was very excited to hear them speak, were our set theorists Livingstone and Lunt. They recounted their experience working in the regulatory industry. They explained that although regulatory bodies are usually associated with just issuing fines, they also research and consult experts (sometimes for free as in Livingstone's case). However, they should spend more time consulting the public as the regulation being imposed is for their benefit and the issues it is aiming to solve are affecting them, leading to a show of hands from the audience as to whether there should be greater regulation of social media. They also spoke specifically of the regulatory body 'OFCOM' which is established by law (unlike bodies such as IPSO) and "evidence based". Recently, OFCOM has gained regulatory powers within the BBC which promotes an issue as the BBC is meant to be an independent and self-regulating industry. They also brought up the issue of the decline of use of the BBC, especially amongst the younger generation. They argued that this meant the BBC has "no future" as it is meant to be universal, aka used by all generations. That idea left me in thought for a while as we left the venue.

I am so glad I had the chance to attend this conference and I highly encourage anyone who is able to go to take that opportunity. Nothing can truly explain just how useful and genuinely interesting the day was and I would like to thank our teachers Ms Casson, Mr Escott and Miss Midwinter for taking us.









#### Economics and Business trip to Amsterdam
