Throughout the day, the instructor provided detailed demonstrations of the dissection process and shared fascinating insights into medicine and human anatomy, enriching our learning experience. Following the instructions, we organised ourselves into groups to conduct the dissection, which fostered initiative and heightened our scientific curiosity.

This experience not only deepened our grasp of the A-Level Biology curriculum, but also served as valuable preparation for those interested in pursuing Medicine or other biological studies after school.

Sociology Lunchtime Lecture

Guest Lecturer Professor Heidi Mirza Speaks to Sociology A level students

As the first speaker in the Sociology A level Summer Lunchtime Lecture Programme, in June, Professor Heidi Mirza delivered an online lecture to A level students.

Profess or Mirza leads on Race, Faith and Culture at Goldsmith University and is the Emeritus Professor of Equalities Studies in Education at the Institute of Education at UCL. She has worked with various Governments to advise on school improvement in areas of diversity and inclusion. Professor Mirza is a key theorist on the Sociology A level course. She is a leading Black Difference and Intersectional feminist.

Students were interested to hear about her route into academia and experiences as a black female academic. She was one of the first black female professors in the UK and she spoke about the sexism and racism that she has faced in her career.

Professor Mirza spoke about her seminal work 'Young, Female and Black' where she researched the experience of black girls in schools in the 1990s. She also spoke about her more recent research on the experience of Muslim girls in the education system.

Hearing from Professor Mirza directly about her research was inspirational for the students and really enriches their academic experience. We are very grateful to Professor Heidi Mirza for giving up her time for us.



Sociology Lunchtime Lecture Programme

Social Science at Oxbridge

Miss Sangha, delivered a presentation to social science A level students explaining the process of applying to Cambridge and Oxford to study social science related subjects.

Miss Sangha spoke about her experience of studying Psychology at Cambridge university. She told students about the array of opportunities available to them, and how they can prepare for the application and interview process. This was a great opportunity for students to ask questions and debunk any myths that they may have about the process.

Sociology In Action Trip

Eighteen A level sociology students attended the Sociology in Action conference at the Emanual Centre in London. Renowned feminist Professor Ann Oakley spoke about her fifty-year sociology career and research. At age 79, Prof Ann Oakley, is still working in the field, and her research is still making a difference to gender based social policy. Students were inspired by hearing Professor Jason Arday speak about his experiences breaking through in the education system as a young, black, autistic student with global delay. He talked about his research about ethnicity and inequalities in the education system, and the importance of celebrating and promoting Black History in the curriculum. He is the youngest ever professor to be appointed at Cambridge.

Sociology Lunchtime Lecture Programme

Sociology A level students have been visited by a range of guest academics this term, as part of the Lunchtime Lecture Programme. In recent weeks students have attended online lectures from Professor Heidi Mirza from UCL, Dr Skinner from Bath University, Dr Cecile Menghini from Exeter University, Professor Gillborn from Birmingham University and in-person lecture from Dr Katy Wheeler from Exeter University. Speakers have lectured on a range of topics related to the Sociology A level, including Education, Disability Inequality in Society, The Sociology of Consumption and Criminology research into gang crime.

Year 10 students joined us for the criminology talk as part of their careers programme.

The lectures have really brought sociology to life for students and are excellent enrichment. They have learnt how quantitative and qualitative research is carried out in the field as well as the impact of sociological research on social policy.

In the Autumn term, we look forward to hearing from Professor Louise Archer from UCL speaking about her research into social class, gender and educational achievement, Professor Steve Tombs speaking about Grenfell Tower, and a representative from Hertford College, Oxford University talking about the PPE course.

National Sociology Competition Winner

The Sociology Department are proud to see Year 12 student, Chinedum Chima, announced as the Tutor2u National Sociology Essay competition winner. In response to the title 'Is There Value Consensus in Contemporary Society', Chinedum concluded that in today's multi-cultural society there is no longer just one set of shared values. The essay explored sociological perspectives of Functionalism, Marxism, Feminism and Postmodernism and applied theory to contemporary events such as clapping for the NHS during the pandemic, as well as exploring the impact of different religious views and considering intersectional feminism.

Chinedum is planning to study sociology at university at both undergraduate and postgraduate level.

Geography Southchurch Park Trip



Year 7 enjoyed their first experience of a Geography fieldwork trip looking at biodiversity at Southchurch Park. Whilst all classes completed the same fieldwork and booklet, each day was very different

from a soggy Monday morning to a warm sunny Wednesday!

The students worked hard throughout each morning looking at plant species in transects across different sections of the park. They utilised

plant species guides and the expert knowledge of Mrs Brierley and Mr Gilson throughout the mornings to identify the correct names of plants ranging from foxtail and common grass, to chamomile and spotted medic. They also completed soundscapes, a unique fieldwork technique, to see how sound varied across the park. Students will now use the data collected in two follow up lessons back in the classroom to present and analysing the data they collected against a hypothesis.

A special thanks to Mrs Brierley and Mr Gilson for their expert knowledge, and Ms Spilstead, Mrs Robinson, Mrs Law and Ms Graham for all their help on the trips.

abilities.

Our SHSG trio of Computer Science students (Ashlyn, Elsa, and Samriti) performed admirably presenting their ideas of an application for smart phones aimed at improving 13–18 years olds mental health, with innovative and complex concepts including cloud storage and web APIs to store, retrieve and process data. They discussed their wireframe application design of each screen, the rationale and research behind the idea, feedback from a variety of sources to refine the idea, and the final application design and walkthrough.

After the presentation they fielded a range of challenging questions from the judging panel working as a team to discuss and give reasoned answers.

Their 10-minute presentation was highly praised by a panel of industry leaders from the BBC, Amazon AWS and Lego. In the end they were a close runner up to the winning team, the feedback they received was extremely positive and this competition is seen as the "World Cup" of application development for students, with hundreds of entrants across the whole of the UK. Our students participated in a tour of the headquarters with a view of the surrounding London city Landscape from the roof which was breathtaking. The Amazon team who hosted us were very welcoming and we came back with goodie boxes of AWS hats, wireless headphones, water bottles and for the adults AWS socks! As teachers we were so impressed by our students' fantastic attitudes, behaviour, innovative ideas, and confidence to present to others at industry

level. Well done!
















The Biology captains explored the five senses with students looking at how the senses evolve as we age. The Physics captains helped the students to create


parachutes to protect items dropped from a height. The Chemistry captains and students worked together to solve the murder mystery of who killed the Chemistry teacher.

Essex University Trip

As part of the continuing Careers education provision at SHSG it is important that we enable students to have a hands on experience of what university life may be like. We work in conjunction with the charity 'Make Happen' who aim to make all students aware of their post 18 choices. Year 10 had a fantastic day out at Essex University. They had a tour of the extensive campus from student ambassadors and had a really detailed talk about student life, going into details such as the wide variety of societies that are available to how to do ones laundry. The students got to sit in sample lectures in law and sport psychology. It was a very warm but inspiring day, for many of our students it was their first experience of a campus university and will give them lots to consider for their future.





Year 12 Royal Holloway University of London - Essay Competition

We visited the Royal Holloway University where we represented the school for the very first time at their annual essay competition. For the competition, we had to create a video and a poster responding to the question "How can psychologists/psychology promote healthier working environments in schools?". After arriving at the university, we briefly walked around the campus, admiring the stunning architecture, before heading in for an introductory talk by Dr Mirta Stantic. After the



talk, the first out of two poster sessions began (which was our session) and we were approached by judges, including PhD students and professors at the university, who listened to us present our poster and asked us questions to challenge our psychological brains. In between the sessions, we had the pleasure of listening to Dr Gemma Northam deliver a talk on neuropsychology and Professor Jessie Rickets, who considered whether reading could be considered a virus. We enjoyed these fascinating talks as they linked quite closely to the areas of psychology we are interested in. At the end of the day, they announced the winners. Although we did not win, what we came out with was a deeper understanding of the plethora of careers available in psychology and a sense of pride in ourselves for participating. The competition was an invigorating experience, and I highly recommend it for any future psychologists.

Psychology in Action conference

Year 12 Psychology guest lecture

Year 12 psychology students had the opportunity to attend an online guest lecture with Prof Becky Milne from Portsmouth University. She has a wide array of experience in psychology and criminology but of particular interest to us was her experience working with the police in developing the Cognitive Interview to help make eyewitness testimonies a more accurate form of evidence. Prof Milne has worked not only with police departments in the UK and Ireland but also around the world including Australia, New Zealand, and Singapore. She has been heavily influential in researching in this area, but also in writing policies, training the police and she has worked on several high-profile cases. The students enjoyed hearing about her first-hand experience in this field and it gave them a real insight into how important psychological research has been in aiding our understanding of human memory in the real world. Prof Milne was also able to provide some practical memory revision tips and she has passed on some related wider reading for students to engage with. We thank her very much for giving up her time and look forward to hopefully seeing her again in the future.

Year 8 students had their first taste of Germany. They were amazed to find themselves in the picturesque Rhine Valley after a ten-hour coach journey from Southend.

On the first full day, students immersed themselves in medieval history on a guided tour of Eltz Castle asking the guide many questions. The castle refectory gave students their first opportunity to practise their spoken German. Two hours later we were calmly being elevated by chairlift to the famous Vierseenblick in the hills above Boppard for a spectacular Rhenish panorama.

On the second day, students climbed the Drachenfels in Konigswinter and learnt of the German sagas and legends of the Rheingold and Nibelungen. Later that afternoon, students explored the Deutsches Eck in Koblenz peering into the depths of the Rhein/Mosel confluence. There was also time to ride the cable car over the Rhine to the impressive fortress of Ehrenbreitstein. In the evening a pilgrimage took place in the village where we were staying and our students were complimented on their courtesy and thanked for their support as the procession passed the hotel.

On the final full day students scaled the Loreley Rock having been enthralled by the legend on our approach. A short drive took us to Rüdesheim where we soared above the vineyards in a cable car towards the striking monument overlooking the Rhine. Students practised their language skills once more in the streets of Rüdesheim taking in the Drosselgasse and impressing many American tourists who had descended on this delightful town. Students also got into the spirit of the Euros by wearing German flag deely boppers, given out free with every purchase. Our hotel accommodation overlooking the Rhine was perfect and taste buds erupted as students tucked into the finest German fayre served every evening in the restaurant.

Students behaved impeccably throughout, and staff were impressed with their willingness to get involved. All students are looking forward to visiting Germany again in Year 10.

I first found out about Into Film when I was 7 years old from my dad. His school often ran



Chicago Write up

Chicago - By Aled C Year 12

Going into Chicago I already had high expectations, Southend High School for Girls has yet to put on a production that has not exceeded the typical standards of what a school can achieve on a limited budget. But this being my first experience of Chicago means that I cannot comment on the production's accuracy or compare it to other versions, so this article will be reviewing Southend High School for Girl's latest musical as a stand alone.

The first element I feel I must comment on is the spectacular costumes and set designs. Roxy and Velma's costumes clearly set them apart from the rest of the cast, emphasising their importance in the narrative. The clothing was often simple yet completely elegant, notably Velma's dress for 'All That Jazz'. The ensemble did not fail to match the bar set by the leads, with period accurate and danceable costumes. What I especially noticed was the inclusion of a masculine variation that still blended with the rest of the group, a very difficult endeavour when all bar one of the ensemble were wearing matching dresses. On a similar note, the set design stunned me. Obviously as a student I had walked past items like the prison bars in the corridor, but I had not expected it to all come together so cohesively on stage. I felt fully engrossed in the 'Cell Block Tango' and Court Room scene due to their sets and the seamless scene changes, aided by the directors Safa and Isobel. There was no hindrance on the audience's absorption in the narrative (something even professional productions can falter with).

Linking to the professional skills displayed by this school production, the choreography throughout the entire show definitely deserves mentioning. From the start it was clear the choreography was carefully constructed and rehearsed down to perfection. During 'Overture/All That Jazz' the entirety of the stage was filled with dancers keeping busy and almost constantly moving. The audience, myself included, could not help but have their full attention grasped by the stage, constantly having a new person or action to focus on. The juxtaposition of this with the fluidity of Velma was the perfect kind of whiplash that truly encapsulated the standout dialogue, "That's Chicago!" The aerial choreography for 'Cell Block Tango' was completely unexpected and had the audience on the edge of their seats. Whilst not so extreme, the use of the set as part of the choreography for 'When You're Good to Mama' had me equally fascinated. The use of the prison bars as a form of prop in the dance was immensely entertaining to watch as well as ingenious for the students, namely Freya, who choreographed the production.

And of course, I have to finish this section by gushing about the long-awaited duet between Roxy and Velma in Act Two. The two actresses were perfectly in sync with one another, no easy feat, especially considering how little time they must have had to practice.

Not only was Chicago tense and beautiful at times, but also downright hilarious. The dialogue in 'Cell Block Tango' had me laughing harder with the introduction of each new prisoner. Standout lines included, "I fired two warning shots. Two warning shots into his head," and, "We broke up over artistic differences. He saw himself alive, I saw him dead." The humour combined with the deadpan deliverance was absolutely perfect and I would find it difficult to believe any member of the audience did not find it funny. Another one of my favourite moments has to be the physical comedy from Billy and Roxy in 'We Both Reached for the Gun'. The puppetry motif and choreography reflected the lyrics in the best and funniest way possible.

Now I feel it suitable to talk about the memorable actors, each in their own paragraphs, of course starting with Roxy. Isabella completely embodied the limelight of Roxy, filling the stage with her personality. Her vocals never faltered and apart from one dialogue slip-up, her acting was impeccable for an individual so young. I may not have seen the alternate cast, but I have heard from many that Emily was as equally talented in the lead role.

Elicia had the most powerful vocals in the production, in my opinion, as Velma. Her performances in songs such as 'I Can't Do It Alone' and 'My Own Best Friend' showed off not only her musical abilities, but also her grasp on acting. The audience could feel the emotions oozing out of Velma as she lost fame to Roxy and recounted always being her" own best friend". As with Isabella's counterpart, I only heard glowing reviews for the alternate Velma, Ella.

Didi was the perfect Amos (though I do anticipate equally matched by Jessica). Despite not having the most lines, I felt the uttermost pity for Amos, especially after 'Mr Cellophane' due to Didi's spectacular performance. It was to the point audience members found her after the show just to compliment her on her emotional portrayal. (How I know this, you may ask? My mother did exactly that after the Friday evening performance, much to Didi's surprise I must expect.)

Finally, I want to combine Evie and Charlie's portrayals of Mary Sunshine and Billy Flynn respectively. Though both amazing in their own regards, having dazzling on-stage personalities and brilliant line delivery, they complimented one another perfectly to elevate each other. Subtle hints to an affair between the two characters may have been missed by some without inside knowledge from the cast, such as I have, but for those who noticed it added another layer of humorous narrative to the production.

I feel the perfect way to wrap up this article is not with my opinion, as I'm sure by now anyone reading this can tell I was a fan, but with quotes I managed to grab from some staff and crew on Friday evening:

"It's so lovely to watch it all from the sidelines, see everyone being happy after doing well, you've got to hype them up" – Isobel (Director + Crew)






