The presentations included some suggestions such as: making Southend High Street a brighter and more colourful place reducing the amount of litter along the paths using the vacant buildings and shops for something useful and helpful.

The winning presentation was in class 8A with a wonderful, clever plan for how to re-design Southend High Street. Some of the winning points included:

Creating dedicated cycle paths to reduce accidents and improve safety for cyclists and pedestrians.

Designing vibrant, colourful benches to make public spaces more welcoming and encourage people to stop and enjoy their surroundings. Increasing the presence of security personnel in Southend to enhance the sense of safety and reassurance for all visitors.

Geography to Trip to South-West Iceland

An Unforgettable Iceland Adventure for SHSG Geographers! "Úti er ævintýri – Adventure is Out There!"

A group of 35 years 10–13 GCSE and A Level students set off on an action-packed trip to south-west Iceland; and what a journey it was! From standing between tectonic plates at the Bridge Between Continents to tucking into a pizza buffet and soaking in the Blue Lagoon with a face mask and a mocktail, every day offered something new.

Day two focused on Iceland's volcanic power: we witnessed brand-new lava fields near Reykjanes, hiked through the steamy valley of Reykjadalur, and explored one of Iceland's largest lava tunnels for a multi-sensory underground experience. We even drove through the abandoned town of Grindavík, before winding down with hot tubs and board games at the hotel.

Next came waterfall day, starting at the interactive LAVA Centre, where students felt what a 3.6 earthquake would be like! We visited Vík, admired the basalt columns and black sand beach of

Reynisfjara, then marvelled at a rainbow over Skógafoss before climbing to the top for breathtaking views. We continued to Seljalandsfoss, walking behind the cascading water and



getting joyfully soaked, and ended the day discovering the hidden Gljúfrabúi (the Canyon Dweller), accessed by wading through a gorge.

Pure magic!

Our final day was the iconic Golden Circle Tour. We walked around the striking Kerið crater at sunrise, watched geysers erupt at Haukadalur, stood in awe at the double cascade of Gullfoss (Golden Falls), and ended at Þingvellir National Park, where students stood on the Mid-Atlantic Ridge and saw the historic site where Iceland's leaders once gathered.

A celebratory dinner at the Hard Rock Café and free time in Reykjavík rounded off a truly

unforgettable trip. As one student summed it up: "My favourite trip ever!"

Mr Prior, our Science Lead Practitioner and medics pathway lead, is one of our staff attending.

Year 9 Curriculum Day


Bronze DofE Expedition May 10/11 2025


Essex Track & Field Championships


